## GENERAL INFORMATION

### Historical Sketch

Fayetteville State Teachers College is the oldest Teacher Education institution established in North Carolina. Founded in 1867 through the philanthropy of seven Negro citizens and General O. O. Howard of the Freedmen's Bureau, the school was known originally as the Howard School. Attracting statewide attention largely through the leadership of its first principal, Robert Harris, the school was subsequently headed by Charles W. Chestnutt, the distinguished writer. Later, Dr. Ezekiel Ezra Smith was chosen to head the institution, known by this time as the State Normal School at Fayetteville. With two interruptions, once when called to serve as Minister Resident and Consul-General of the U. S. to Liberia, and again when he served as Adjutant of the 3rd North Carolina Volunteer Infantry, Dr. Smith served as President of the institution for fifty years. In these absences the institution was headed respectively by George H. Williams and by R. E. Fairley.

In 1933 upon the retirement of Dr. Smith, J. Ward Seabrook, Dean, was appointed to the Presidency. In 1939 the State Legislature changed the name of the institution to the Fayetteville State Teachers College and authorized it to prepare elementary teachers and principals for the state of North Carolina.

### Location

The Fayetteville State Teachers College is located within the city limits on Murchison Road approximately one mile north of the railway depot. It may be conveniently reached by bus or by taxicabs.

### Rating of the College

Fayetteville State Teachers College is a member of the Association of Teacher Education Institutions. It is rated in Class "A" of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and in the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education.



## Student Life and Activities

The College encourages all students to participate in some one or more extra-curricular activities although the primary concern of the college is with the students' maintenance of proficiency in the various academic fields. Through its guidance services the institution attempts to meet the varied needs of the students.

Provisions are made within the college for a total environment conducive to wholesome personality development. Religious activities are non-sectarian and the two student organizations, the Y.W.C.A. and Y.M.C.A., are factors in the development of Christian character and leadership. Recreational rooms are available and through the health services staff an infirmary is maintained. Under the supervision of the Social Committee, social gatherings are arranged from time to time at which students may mingle for a few hours of wholesome enjoyment. In addition, there are numerous clubs and organizations to which students may belong in conjunction with academic and social activities inclusive of sororities and fraternities. Outstanding artists are brought to the institution periodically through the Lyceum series.

The college for several years was a member of the Eastern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference and its basketball team has been several times champion. Recently the institution has joined the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. Sports competition in football, basketball, track and baseball is maintained.

## Withdrawals

A student who finds it necessary to withdraw from school before the close of the school year should make the necessary arrangements through the Dean's and Registrar's Office for honorable dismissal.

## Rules and Regulations

The College assumes that all students will conduct themselves in a manner consistent with recognized standards of good taste and propriety which should characterize good students and honorable citizens. Whenever in the judgment of the Student Life and Conduct Committee any student does not meet the requirements of acceptable conduct and cannot be helped to the point

of meeting such requirements, the right is reserved to terminate the student's residence in the College. Furthermore, the privilege of registering or of remaining in the College may be denied an individual who gives no promise of becoming an efficient and successful teacher.

### **What to Bring**

Students (and faculty members living on the campus) must furnish their own bedding, hence should bring adequate linen and blankets. They should also bring curtains, bureau scarfs and other articles necessary to beautify their rooms. Students should bring rubbers, galoshes, raincoats, umbrellas, shower caps, shower shoes, and laundry bag. Each article and all clothing should indicate the student's name in indelible ink.

## **ACADEMIC REGULATIONS**

### **Grading System**

A five-point grading system is used: A, B, C, D, and E. Explanation of the grades follows:

- A, Excellent scholarship .....3 quality points
- B, Good scholarship .....2 quality points
- C, Fair scholarship .....1 quality point
- D, Poor scholarship .....0 quality points
- E, Failure scholarship .....Minus 1 quality point

Other symbols used in the grading system are: I, X, Dr. and Wr.

The "I" indicates incomplete. It is given to a student who has not completed the work of a course. All I's must be removed during the quarter following the one in which they are given if the student is in residence. In no case may an "I" be removed later than one year from the date it is placed on the record. If I's are not removed by the time stipulated, they automatically become E's. "X" indicates that the student was absent from the examination for a legitimate reason. The regulations concerning I's govern X's. "Dr" indicates that the student dropped the course with permission. "Wr" indicates that the student withdrew from the institution.

## Credits

One quarter hour of credit normally represents a class meeting one fifty-five minute period a week for 12 weeks, or the equivalent.

Certain art, music, physical education, and laboratory courses yield one quarter hour of credit for a class meeting two fifty-five minute periods a week for 12 weeks, or the equivalent.

Students who sing in the College Choral Club may receive one hour of credit per quarter.

Technicians and those who have a major role in the Drama Guild productions may receive one hour credit. Helpers to technicians and those in supporting roles may receive one-half hour credit.

One quarter hour is evaluated as equivalent to two-thirds of a semester hour.
